How to use the Writing Criterion Scale

Assessing a piece of writing using the Writing Criterion Scale couldn't be simpler:

- **Step I:** Read the piece carefully and then use a general judgement to choose a Grade to assess against. For example, ask yourself: *Is this a Grade 3 piece?* If the answer is 'no' choose from a higher or lower grade; if the answer is 'maybe' continue the assessment.
- **Step 2:** Read the piece carefully again and then quickly work through each of the criteria using the following marks to indicate your judgement:
 - there is strong evidence here that the child can do this
 - – there is some evidence here that the child can do this
 - X there is no evidence here that the child can do this
- **Step 3:** Count up the ticks, calculate the score, then use the score to assign a Grade; if the judgement is in the 'A' band assess again for the next Grade up
- **Step 4:** Use criteria identified with a to inform immediate next steps for the child with any 'pre-requisite' criteria being urgent targets.
